Along with the monetary goal, we are taking the bold step of being transparent about what this entails from each member of the congregation and asking you to pray, reflect, and then act to make your priorities and desires a reality.

The work of creating the Kin-dom of God is not easy and requires much. We are hopeful that being bold in our ask and transparent in our goals we can work together and create something wonderful with God's help.

One Great Hour of Sharing: A Way to Provide Help Locally and Globally

During the month of March we have another opportunity for generosity as a spiritual practice. **One Great Hour of Sharing** is a special mission that the UCC offers. "The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean water, food, education and health care, small business micro-credit, advocacy and resettlement for refugees and displaced persons, and emergency relief and rehabilitation. OGHS also supports domestic and international ministries for disaster preparedness and response." The UCC is also only one of four denominations to participate in this mission. The American Baptists, Disciples of Christ, and Church of the Brethren all work together with Church World Service to make this ministry possible. The UCC specifically focuses on helping refugees, resettlement, and disaster relief. The Gospel of Matthew 25: 40 reminds us, "Just as you did it to one of the least of these, who are members of my family, you did it for me." Wednesday Night Lenten Experience: Diving Deeper with the Spirit

Lent is a season of invitation. We are invited to begin our journey on **Ash Wednesday March 6th at 7:00p.m.** Our journey into the season of Lent continues as we follow Jesus, as we watch the unveiling of who he is and why he is here, to witness healing and blessing we have only dreamed about, and to reclaim a closeness with God and each other.

This Lenten season you are invited to a new experience of fellowship and worship. On Wednesday evenings we will gather first to discuss and reflect on the prayer of St. Francis of Assisi. Following discussion and conversation, we will gather for a time of contemplative worship. From Lori

A few weeks ago, I preached about my retreat in North Carolina, where I found a shell that felt like a Worry Stone to me. I held it and rubbed it and was transported back to many times with my grandmother (one of many spiritual guides in my life and the person who introduced me to worry stones). And then I heard a voice, "It's not a Worry Stone. It's a Possibility Shell." I snickered to myself. Really? Did I just hear that? Absolutely. I was taken aback, humbled, and deeply grateful for that moment. The ocean was to one side of me. A sea of broken shells was underneath my feet. On my other side was the beautiful landscape of the Carolina Coast – marshlands and beautiful grasses mixed with white sands. I loved that moment and that voice, and they set me on a path to return home even more passionate about life as a parish minister.

On that Sunday, following worship, our child asked me if she could hold the shell. She knew exactly what to do with it, and she knew it was the Possibility Shell. She smiled and ran off... and then I heard her running back down the hallway of the church shouting, "It broke, Mommy! It broke!" And it had. She had dropped the shell in the front entryway of the church, and it broke into four pieces. One piece was lost forever. Three were in her tiny hands. In the moment, I was mad at myself for giving up "my" shell. I was sad to see its rough edges. I wondered if it could be glued back together, but most of all, I was calm in a way that surprised even me. A few people were present, and I could tell they were worried about me. They knew how much I liked that shell.

Well, the broken Possibility Shell has been on my desk for a few weeks, and here's what I've learned: it's still a great symbol for me and for St. Peter's – perhaps even better now that it's broken. Why? Because I do not hold all of the possibilities. The dreams of this congregation are held by all of us – some here, some there, a few tightly, a few loosely. Our dreams are not in the hands of our pastors but in the heart of God, made possible by the hands of ALL of us. I'm comforted by that... and I see that our dreams are already becoming realities! Here's how:

- v That same Sunday, I preached about us getting real about gender-inclusive bathrooms. The next day, I had three emails about that issue specifically. A day later, I received the first donation of money to start the project. And following that, one among us drew architectural plans for a remodeled set of gender-inclusive, accessible, and family-friendly bathrooms. Just two weeks later, Governance Council has formed a team to delve into this possibility, and we are taking steps towards really living our Covenant of Welcome. Fantastic.
- v In a few weeks, I will be out of the office for continuing education for an entire week. I will be taking the Lake Institute's course for an Executive Certificate in Religious Fundraising. It's going to be intense, and it couldn't come at a better time. Our Generosity Team is mailing letters this month to move us into a season of transparency and even more generous giving that reflects our values and mission as a congregation. Possibilities abound.
- v And then there's Lent. It comes every year, and yet, it usually sneaks up on me. This year, however, I crave it. I am ready to push a reset button. I'm ready to delve into the word of God through scripture and conversation. I am ready to journey with Jesus to the cross and beyond. I don't have words for all of these feelings yet, but I'm excited about what lies ahead, even though I don't know what it is exactly. I guess that's faith.






Dear Pastor Bievenour,

I am writing to thank you for your gift of \$1,120 made on 1/30/2019. The Board of Directors and staff of Exodus are grateful for the generosity of faith organizations like yours.

Refugees come to Indianapolis from many different countries, cultures, and experiences. They arrive in our city with few possessions, but with hope and eagerness to work hard, rebuild their lives in safety and freedom, and achieve self-sufficiency. Your donation enables us to continue our mission to serve and empower refugees here in Indianapolis. We could not do it without you.

Presidential Executive Orders and policy shifts have drastically altered the refugee resettlement network in recent years. From Exodus' record high of 947 refugees in 2016, we received just 251 new arrivals last program year. At a time when there are 25.4 million refugees globally, and an additional 40 million internally displaced people, we can and must do more to support the world's most vulnerable.

Regardless of national policy shifts, Exodus remains committed to our work and our mission. Many of our services, such as English classes, mental health services, employment assistance, and medical case management continue to be vital to the refugee community in Indianapolis. We will continue to serve the many refugees we have already helped establish new lives in Indiana, as well as any and all future refugees to come.

Thank you for standing with us and with refugees.

Bystander and Cop Watch Trainings Offered

Elise Whitaker will be leading Bystander Training in February and Cop Watch Training in March at St Peter's. These trainings will be open to the congregation and to the public. Elise Whitaker (they/them) is a scholar, an organizer, and an activist. After cutting their teeth in Los Angeles' Occupy Wall Street actions, Elise went on to co-found an organization called 99Rise aiming to end the corrupting influence of money on the American democracy. Having spent a number of years training in many narrative based, decentralized organizing structures and focusing in particular on issues around money in politics, the movement for black lives, and immigrant rights, Elise is now a full time student and researcher on public policy issues around environmental and racial justice. Both of these trainings were developed by the People's Response Team in Chicago; Elise was trained by American Friends Service Committee.

Bystander Intervention Training – February 28, 6:30-9:00p.m and March 2, 10:00a.m.-12:30p.m. this training focuses on ways to intervene in instances of racist, anti-Immigrant, anti-Black, anti-Muslim, anti-Trans, and other forms of oppressive interpersonal violence and harassment while considering the safety of all parties. Participants will participate in discussions and role plays to practice intervention techniques. No one is an expert on bystander intervention, as different situations and different individual risk factors will influence how each person will intervene; this training will seek to provide a basic framework and resources for the uninitiated and to hold space for people to share their own skills and experiences in a safe and affirming environment.

Cop Watch Training – March 28, 6:30-9:00p.m and March 30, 10:00a.m.-12:30p.m. The goal of this workshop is to quickly train the average person in basic cop-watching laws, methods, and safety considerations, and to promote cop watching as a method of bystander intervention. This training will utilize historical context, group discussions, role playing, and legal information, including tips on how participants might seek to learn more about local laws in their home cities. Family Promise (FP) Hosting March 24th-31st

FP is a not-for-profit organization that helps FAMILIES experiencing homelessness. FP runs two rotations, 14 people each, each week throughout the year. During the day their home base is the FP Day Center. While there, adults get help finding permanent housing, searching for jobs (if they are not already employed) & navigating additional services that are available to them. School age children head off to school/camp from the Day Center. In the evenings, each rotation of guests is welcomed at one of the many congregations in the FP network. St Peter's is one of those congregations. St Peter's typically hosts FP guests four weeks throughout the year. This is where **YOU** come in.

FP provides an opportunity to use your heart and hands to truly make a difference in the lives of people going through an unimaginably difficult time in their lives. You ask...how can I help? Let's count the ways!

During our week of hosting, the following opportunities are available to support this St Peter's ministry & share compassion with our neighbors in need:

- 14 times to drive our guests. (FP van provided)
- 14 meals to host (14 breakfasts, 14 dinners)
- 14 evening hosts (2 each evening)
- 14 overnight hosts (2 each evening, wonderful St Peter's parlor accommodations included)

Formative Congregations Grant Opportunity

Throughout 2018, Lori participated with the Center for Congregations in an experiment they called "Formative Congregations." There were 10 pastors who were invited to this experience, and the congregations were each given a \$3K learning stipend.

The Center for Congregations was so pleased with the results of our experiments that, for the first time ever, they are inviting 8 congregations to continue this work and apply for up to a \$30K grant. St. Peter's Governance Council was delighted to begin this journey.

Diane Carr and Jill Olinger will attend sessions with Lori Bievenour at The Center for Congregations to explore the idea of formative congregations even further; our grant proposal will be due in May 2019. (Note: \$10K could be granted without matching dollars. The additional \$20K would require a congregational match. We are *not* required to apply for the full amount. We are certain that by attending the sessions and continuing our exploratory work in January – May, we will craft a strong proposal, no matter the amount that we land upon!)

"How might our congregation provide experiences that enhance the life of our adherents? The goal of a healthy, functioning congregation will not be the end. It will be the means to a greater end: a congregation that helps its members increase their capacity to live in the deepest and best commitments of faith in every-day life. The goal of the program is not to focus on congregational redevelopment or the organizational structure of the congregation. Nor is the focus on community engagement though there may be elements of these in the project. The focus is on the lives of the people in the congregation." Governance Council will continue to update you on the progress of this opportunity. For now, will you pray for the experience and continue to trust the Spirit as she reveals a way forward for our congregation with this grant opportunity?

If there is a loving God, why do we suffer?

People of faith have been answering this questions for literally thousands of years - the Book of Job, one of the wisdom texts in the Hebrew bible is one of the only places in the Bible that takes on the question head-on. Beyond the Bible, the Book of Job is often found on lists of the best literary works of all time.

Join with Ministry Intern Sam Locke for a four week study of the text and a read-through of the play JB: A Play in Verse, a "modern" retelling of the story that one the Pulitzer Prize and Tony Award for Best Play in 1959.

Donating Stock or Mutual Fund Shares at St. Peter's

Thank you for generously supporting the mission of St. Peter's United Church of Christ! Donating stock or mutual fund shares to the church is a wonderful way to experience both the joy of giving AND significant tax advantages. The tax advantages may include:

- * NO CAPTIAL GAINS TAX payable either by you or by the church
- * NO GIFT OR ESTATE TAX because SPUCC is a charitable organization
- * AN INCOME TAX DEDUCTION based on the present value of the gift

You may find numerous examples of just how powerful this method of giving is by searching online for "donating appreciated stock tax benefits".

An important determination in deciding how to best gift your shares is whether they have increased or decreased in value. If your shares have increased in value they should be "donated" to the church, NOT "redeemed" or "sold" or "cashed-in". If your shares have decreased in value, it's better to sell the shares first and then give the proceeds to the church by personal or brokerage firm check so you may deduct the loss on your taxes.

St Peter's has an account with Merrill Lynch Wealth Management who will help facilitate you in the gifting process.
