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## From Becca

This Lenten season has been unique. Granted each year is a little different, but this year, Lent simply felt different than it usually does. As I've been asked over the past several weeks how Lent has been for me, I have answered with something like: "Well, the previous six months really felt like a wilderness-Lenten-adventure...so I'm not really sure how to enter a season when it feels like I've finally emerged from it." That may sound confusing. Read the sentence again and see if that helps. If not, just keep going. The past six months have been challenging in a number of ways and in a lot of ways, mirrored how I usually experience Lent: somber, slow, painful, even desert-like. And just as Lent was beginning, it felt like I had finally found my way across the desert into more lucious terrain. So Lent had a different feeling this year. It was wider and deeper, but not heavy. Add into the mix an inconstant schedule due to knee surgery, and Lent really felt different this year. But there was one thing that kept me grounded and centered.

Several months ago--during the pre-Lenten Lenten season, I was aching for a more contemplative space, worship and/or experience. So Lori and I talked and dreamed and prayed, and I came up with a contemplative worship service to offer for the six weeks of Lent. It was more work, more time, more planning, and it was life giving in a way that I didn't fully realize I had been missing until it was happening. They were simple services centered around prayer, song, and spiritual practice. It was gift to gather, worship, and hold space for one another. I am continually grateful to serve a community who is willing to try new things, willing to expand and deepen their faith, and continue to unfurl themselves for the sake of vulnerability and transparent faith-doing.

So, in some ways, Lent this year felt like an early Easter. Something new was emerging, something that had been in deep slumber has been awoken. I look forward to whatever surprises and new joys this season of Eastertide brings to each of us this year.

## From Lori

God is teaching me a lot this spring, and so are you. Here's what I mean:

- I'm learning to risk sharing my faith in new ways. Earlier this year, I was asked to be interviewed for a SparkDialog podcast on science and religion. I have never done something like this before, and if I'm being honest, it scared me. Would I say the right thing? Would I sound respectable? Would my faith come through? You can judge for yourself, but I am thankful to have had this experience and hope that someone, somewhere learned something about our congregation's approach to faith and science as a result. - Easter is about new life, and I'm seeing it in new ways all around me. Most recently, our resident hawk showed up in the Native Habitat, and I was reminded that there is a bigger vision for St. Peter's UCC; we just have to be patient and ALL share our gifts to help the newness of life emerge within and around us.
- Every week, you show up and offer joy in our community. One week it's written prayers that offer us glimpses into your lives. The next week, you are volunteering in our community to make it a better place. Soon after, you are calling me to share that you had a fantastic conversation with someone because of something you learned at church.



Friends, living one's faith isn't always easy, but if we focus on sharing God's love in the world in creative ways, that IS living our faith, and it makes a difference. As you ponder and engage new life this season, be in touch, and know that you are not alone on this journey.

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## Bystander Training Recap

Coming into the Bystander Training, I wasn't quite sure what to expect. I had an inkling that I'd be learning how to be a better ally maybe to those in need of help. And in broad terms, that is what we learned. What struck me most, however, were the really practical lessons Elise taught us. Often times when we witness a situation that we gut-know is not right: if we hear someone bullying someone else, if we hear abusive conversation, or witness physical violence, most of us freeze and don't know how to respond in the midst of those situations. Through this training we learned some practical (and even life saving) skills. Breathing is number one. Make sure you are present and calm. If you are going to interact or intervene there are several things you can do and some things you shouldn't do. Do: address the person being bullied/hurt. Make eye contact and address them directly. Don't: engage aggressively with person doing the attacking/bullying. Do: redirect. Sometimes redirecting or starting a new conversation can interrupt the flow of abuse long enough to help the person get away or get to a safe place/person. We had excellent conversation, questions, and role playing to help wiggle out some of our own nervousness. Elise did an excellent job making it a safe space to wonder aloud and learning together. ## Day for Girls IKC Annual Gathering Mission Opportunity

This year's Indiana-Kentucky Conference Annual Gathering Service Project is Days for Girls. Days for Girls is an organization that provides reusable/washable feminine hygiene products for girls and young women in parts of the world where they would otherwise be confined to their homes while menstruating. These kits are a vital part of supporting the education of young girls and women, because without them they would not be able to go to school.

Congregations across the Indiana-Kentucky Conference have been asked to work together to purchase items for the kits and also to sew washable liners and pads to be included in the kits. These items will be combined into the kits at the Annual Gathering May 31-June 1.

If you're able to sew, please consider making and bringing to Annual Gathering the following items:

- Shields made from 100% cotton with PUL (Polyurethane Laminate waterproof fabric) moisture barrier fabric sandwiched between layers, note that the seams need to be serged
- Pads made with 100% cotton flannel (**This is where the greatest need is, because there are 8 pads in each kit!**)
- Drawstring bags, note that a cotton blend can be used for these

You'll need to contact the Days for Girls coordinators for patterns and to find out how to have their help applying snaps to the shields. All shields need snaps. Churches in the northern half of our conference may **contact Linda Lupton at [765-778-8333](tel:765-778-8333) at 1st Congregational Church, Indianapolis**, who can help get you sewing patterns and can apply snaps to your pieces.

First Congregational UCC has expressed an interest in combining our efforts to complete 100 kits by Annual Gathering. **If you are willing to help provide flannel material, tracing skills, cutting skills, and/or sewing skills to help make the 800 pads needed for these kits, please contact Linda Lupton at the number above.** Please look for future notices on upcoming sewing days in weekly e-mails. We thank you for sharing your time, talent, and treasure with us as we support this mission. May God prosper the work of our hands!

## Formative Congregations Grant Draft Submitted

Throughout 2018, Lori participated with the Center for Congregations in an experiment they called "Formative Congregations." There were 10 pastors who were invited to this experience, and the con- gregations were each given a \$3K learning stipend. Participating congregations have now been offered an opportunity to apply for \$30K to continue their work. Diane Carr, Jill Olinger, and Lori Bievenour have prepared a draft proposal which was approved by Governance Council and submitted to the Cen- ter for Congregations in April. A final version of this grant will be submitted in May, but below is where we started. Contact Jill Olinger with questions (jillolinger@comcast.net).

*The focus of our Formative Congregations grant is personal narrative as a spiritual practice. Many people in our congregation have life experiences that, if shared, is certain to inspire others and deepen the faith and connection of both the storytellers and the listeners.*

*St. Peter's UCC is known as a safe place where people can be their true selves, and we want to build on that strength. We believe that sharing our stories will bolster our individual and communal capacity for effec- tively leading and living through change in positive and healthy ways. Increasing our individual and com- munal ability to lead and live through change is also expected to help us to live more fully and deeply into our Covenant of Welcome. This Covenant, put to word and adopted in 2005, remains the bedrock of the congregation and continues to inspire people both within and outside of our congregation.*

*We have also seen a trend in the wider world and in the antidotal stories of congregational members that people are increasingly uncomfortable talking about their faith when it doesn't match the narrative of what media, friends, or other family members proclaim what is or is not Christian. We believe that we have an affirmative Christian message to share, but we also see that our congregational members often struggle to find words and ways to share their beliefs such that they do not create conflict but instead build commu- nity. We want to change that trend and believe that this grant can provide momentum to do just that.*

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### Covenant of Welcome Changes Proposed

In a desire to fully live out our Covenant of Welcome, and to ensure that it is as welcoming as possible to all members of our congregation and our community, our Governance Council has engaged in a process of discernment around an update to the Covenant. Having heard input from the congregation, and grounded in research on statements of non-discrimination and inclusion from other organizations, we propose to amend our Covenant (as well as our Congregation's Constitution & Bylaws), to the following (additions in **bold**):

We acknowledge our diversities ... and we welcome, respect and support people of every race, ethnicity, economic status, sexual orientation, gender **identity and expression**, age, marital status, and physical as well as mental ability. We are a community where all are equal, all are loved, and all are respected for who and what they are — and for what they can become.

We propose this addition because we believe that our covenant is not clearly and completely welcoming to all members of the LGBTQ community in its current form. Sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression are distinct. **Sexual orientation** is defined by one's emotional, romantic, or sexual feelings toward other people. **Gender identity** is defined by one's personally held sense of being male, female, a combination of both, or neither. **Gender expression** refers to things like appearance, clothing, mannerisms and other ways that a person expresses their gender identity. Transgender people have a gender identity that does not necessarily match the gender that they were assigned at birth. Some transgender people identify as gay, lesbian, or bisexual, but others identify as straight or heterosexual. Some people have a gender expression that does not conform to traditional societal expectations, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity. Recognizing that transgender people face some of the highest levels of discrimination in the LGBTQ community, we discern that explicitly naming both sexual orientation and gender identity and expression in our covenant is important to ensuring that our Covenant of Welcome is clearly inclusive of all people.

### Bathroom Conversations Continue

Earlier this year, we initiated conversations about possibilities for a bathroom remodel of our front bathrooms. (The ones located across from the coat rack). The desire from each conversation and encounter has been to live out our Covenant of Welcome to the best of our ability. Craig Penquite, Rick Searcy, and Seth Kreigh are leading this endeavor with enthusiasm and care and hope to have an update in the near future.

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*Our upcoming Town Hall Meeting on May 19 at 10:00a.m. will provide an opportunity for dialog on this amendment, prior to it being formally proposed for adoption at our annual Congregational Meeting on June 9 at 10:00a.m.*

*If updates to our Bathroom Remodel are available for the Town Hall Meeting, they will be shared as well. ## Donating Stock or Mutual Fund Shares at St. Peter's

Thank you for generously supporting the mission of St. Peter's United Church of Christ! Donating stock or mutual fund shares to the church is a wonderful way to experience both the joy of giving AND significant tax advantages.

The tax advantages may include:

- \* NO CAPITAL GAINS TAX payable either by you or by the church
- \* NO GIFT OR ESTATE TAX because SPUCC is a charitable organization
- \* AN INCOME TAX DEDUCTION based on the present value of the gift

You may find numerous examples of just how powerful this method of giving is by searching online for "donating appreciated stock tax benefits".

An important determination in deciding how to best gift your shares is whether they have increased or decreased in value. If your shares have increased in value they should be "donated" to the church, NOT "redeemed" or "sold" or "cashed-in". If your shares have decreased in value, it's better to sell the shares first and then give the proceeds to the church by personal or brokerage firm check so you may deduct the loss on your taxes.

St Peter's has an account with Merrill Lynch Wealth Management who will help facilitate you in the gifting process.
